Annual Seminar in KJM

On 28th and 29th of January 2016 a two day seminar was held in KJM where the second year students of theology presented their field study on “Superstitions among the Chotanagpur Tribals” with a Special Reference to Rabga Panchayat. The different topics dealt with by the brothers are as follows: Superstition among the people in general, World view of tribals, Rituals and beliefs of rites of passage and Theological response to the superstitious belief of Chotanagpur tribals. Despite the diverse range of subject matter, it all seemed to fit together well, turning outdated beliefs on witches and witchcraft creating reactions and thought processes within the audience. Dr. Nabor Soreng, the speaker of the first day with his presentation on ‘practice of withcraft and its consequences: a challenge to modern society’ threw light on the world of witchcraft. Rev. Fr. Freddy Santhumayer SVD, the speaker on the second day highlighted the possible risks and very real harm posed by the belief in spirit possession and witchcraft. The session closed with an interactive session focusing on the skills necessary to explore and analyse cases involving belief in

Ecclesio-Eucharistic Exposure

Exposure in the Slum



“Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.” (Mt 25:40). We the first year students of KJM Theologate got another golden opportunity to experience the life of the marginalized people through our *slum exposure*. We, 11 students of theology accompanied by our guide, Fr. Ajay Sabhasundar went to a slum named Jamtoli in Rourkela and spent 12 days with the slum dwellers. Many of us were not used to life in the

slums; there were lots of queries and uneasy feelings before going there: how the days will pass and how to adjust to slum life? Struggles and hurdles were many in the initial days as there were fewer facilities in the slum. The first four days were hard to live in the slum but as the days passed we took the challenge, accepted, adjusted and gave our best because every cloud has a silver lining. By living amidst the slum dwellers and interacting with them, listening to them, observing their life style, background and social life touched and transformed us. This experience has brought an attitudinal change in our life style too. Many of us had a negative attitude towards the slum dwellers but through this exposure we came to know that they are good, loving and hard working people. In the light of this exposure now we can say that we are marching ahead with our KJM motto of “*Action-Reflection-Action*” which is forming us for a greater cause.
